Cell Phone Policy

Technology has made our lives easier in so many ways especially when it comes to the way we communicate.

Not only does it enhance our lives, it can also be a distraction so in order to keep focus on academics, we ask that all cell phones remain in students' backpacks and turned off or silenced while in class.

Students may use them before school, during lunch and after school. There may be exceptions such as the teacher has given permission to use it. When technology is required, all notifications are required to be turned off and only used for classroom work.

Any violation of these rules will result in the phone being confiscated and given to Mrs. Aden in the front office. An notification email will be sent to a parent or guardian of the violation and information on how and when to pick the phone. Similar to baseball, 3rd strike and you're outta here, after 3rd violation the phone will need to be left at home or checked-in to Mrs. Aden first thing in the morning and picked up at the end of the day.

There's a right time and right place to use your phone - thank you for your cooperation!

Student ID Policy

Based on recommendations from security experts, Sonoran Trails Middle School students are required to wear his or her student ID visibly at all times when on campus. This is a district-wide policy for high school and middle school students.



Our policy is as follows:

When students arrive on campus, they must wear their Student ID on a lanyard around their neck. The ID is to be worn, not kept in their backpack or pocket – it must be visible at all times. Students need to use their ID's for the following;

• check out a book in the Library, purchase food in the cafeteria, participate in school activities or ride the bus

If a student forgets their ID, they will need to get a temporary ID in the front office.

If they receive 5 temporary ID's, their account will be charged \$5 for a new ID.

After a student receives 10 total temporary ID's, they will be charged for another ID and for every 5 temporary ID's after that. After a student receives 17 temp ID's, they will be charged for a new ID everytime they forget their ID.

CCUSD / STMS STUDENT DRESS CODE

Cave Creek Unified School District schools pride themselves on providing a safe, orderly and respectful environment in which students are challenged to achieve at high academic levels and demonstrate the essence of good character and good citizenship. The following guidelines will assist you and your child in making good decisions about what to wear to school and you can help us enforce this policy by referring to it as you plan your school clothing purchases.

The following examples do not cover all situations:

- Clothing should have adequate coverage to allow a full range of movement without skin or undergarments showing
- · Undergarments must not be visible
- · Clothing must cover the entire buttocks and extend a reasonable length to ensure modesty.
- Students shall not wear:
 - · Tank tops with straps less than 1 inch
 - · Garments with spaghetti straps without a cover up
 - Halter-tops
 - Strapless garments
 - Sagging pants
 - o "see-through," low cut, or expose the midriff
 - Vulgar, offensive messages



 Clothing that displays vulgar, offensive, obscene, or libelous messages that demean others on the basis of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or disability; that promotes alcohol or drug use or violence; or that are otherwise contrary to the school's educational mission.

Footwear/Jewelry/Accessories

- · Shoes or sandals must be worn at all times on campus according to state law and for student safety
- · Body piercing that is a safety hazard and/or hinders performance in a classroom is not allowed
- Wallet chains are not allowed
- · Hats are allowed in outside areas only
- Pandemic Face Covering
 - K-12 students will wear a cloth face covering when social distancing is not possible. Failure to wear a cloth face covering may result in disciplinary action.

Student/Parent Responsibility Students and their parents/guardians have the responsibility to be aware of the school's dress code and conform to these requirements. If a student or parent has any questions about whether specific attire or accessories are in compliance with the dress code, they should contact their school administration prior to wearing such attire or accessories to ensure compliance. <u>Here</u> is where you can find the complete write up of the CCUSD Student Dress, Conduct and Appearance.

Administrator Discretion:

The school administration retains the final discretion to determine that the garment or accessory meets the dress code. Some exceptions may be made for uniforms, formal attire, and/or costumes.

Consequences:

Any student violating this policy is subject to disciplinary action including, but not limited to; warning, parent conference, detention, community service or off campus suspension. In addition, the student will remove the garment or accessory and replace it with an appropriate alternative provided by the school, student, or parent.

Checking Out Library Books

- Students may check out up to 2 books at a time for a period of 2 weeks.
- Students may renew their books one time, if there is no hold on the books.
- They can renew their books in the library or online by clicking on the "Renew Your Books Here!" link on the Library's homepage.
- Students may only renew books if they are not overdue. If a book is overdue by approximately one month, the book will be marked lost and the replacement cost of the book will be charged to the student's account.


